You will be able to make your application online from **12 September 2024**.

The closing date for secondary applications is **31 October 2024**. This is the statutory national closing date set by the Government.

Where the number of applications for admission is greater than the published admission number, applications will be considered against the criteria, and in the order, set out below. After the admission of children with statements of special education need which name the Academy on the statement, applications will be considered from:

- a) students in public care/‘looked after’ children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
- b) students, who at the time of application, have a sibling[#] on the roll in the Academy and who will still be on the Academy’s roll at the time the applicant **starts** at the 11–14 Academy;
- c) other children. Priority will be given on the basis of the closeness of the child’s home to either the Basildon Lower Academy or the Basildon Upper Academy, whichever is nearer. Proximity will be measured by straight line distance*.

In the event of a tie in either category ‘b’ or ‘c’ above the Chair of Governors, supervised by an independent scrutineer, will draw names.

[#] For the purposes of criterion (b) above, a sibling of an applicant means a natural brother or sister, step-siblings, half-brother or half-sister of the applicant, or adopted brother or sister, who will be living with the applicant at the same address on the date of their entry to the Academy.

* For the purposes of criterion (c) the straight line distance will be measured from the address-point of the student’s home to the address-point of either Academy site, whichever is nearer and regardless of distance of travel. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet. Applications will be considered against the criteria, and in the order, set out below. After the admission of children with statements of special education need which name the Academy on the statement, applications will be considered from:

- a) students in public care/‘looked after’ children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
- b) children who, at the time of application, are on the roll of the Basildon Lower Academy. Priority will be given on the basis of the closeness of the child’s home to either the Basildon Lower Academy or the Basildon Upper Academy, whichever is nearer. Proximity will be measured by straight line distance*;
- c) other children. Priority will be given on the basis of the closeness of the child’s home to either the Basildon Lower Academy or the Basildon Upper Academy, whichever is nearer. Proximity will be measured by straight line distance*.

In the event of a tie in categories ‘b’ or ‘c’ above, the Chair of Governors, supervised by an independent scrutineer, will draw names.

* For the purposes of criteria (b) and (c) the straight line distance will be measured from the address-point of the student’s home to the address-point of either Academy site, whichever is nearer and regardless of distance of travel. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet. Where a student lives for part of each week at a different address, the ‘home’ address shall be that address which is the main family home and where the student spends the majority of the week.

How to apply for a place in Year 10

Applications will be handled in accordance with the process and timetable for the co-ordination of pupil admissions to secondary schools published in this booklet. Applications should be made as follows:

Parents of children attending Year 9 of the Basildon Lower Academy must sign the transfer register available at the Upper Academy by the published closing date to apply to transfer their child to Year 10 at the Upper Academy. If your child is attending the Basildon Lower Academy and you do not sign the transfer register at the Upper Academy, your child will not be offered a place at the school. This may result in your child being without a school place in Year 10 as the Upper Academy is the only school in Basildon and neighbouring areas that admits children into Year 10 as a normal year of entry. Parents can apply for a place in Year 10 at another secondary school as well as signing the transfer register at the Upper Academy by completing a Mid-Year Application Form available from the Local Authority. Applications for transfer to other schools in September 2025 received by the Local Authority on the Mid-Year Application Form will be treated as casual admissions and will not be determined until the second half of the summer term 2025. The offer of a place in Year 10 at an alternative school will be dependent on there being spaces available at the school.

Parents with children in Year 9 at other secondary schools who wish to apply for a place in Year 10 from September 2025 must complete the Upper Academy application form available from the LA and return it to the LA by the published closing date.

Admissions to Sixth Form

There will be open access to post 16 provision for the Academy’s own pupils. A full range of courses will be available and students will agree their programmes with Academy tutors, at the level appropriate to their ability. The same course provision and enrolment arrangements will apply to external applicants.

The Academy will admit up to 70 external applicants in Year 12. If more than 70 external applicants apply for a place, after the admission of children with statements of special educational need which name the Academy, priority will be given in the following order:

- 1) Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
- 2) other children. Priority will be given on the basis of closeness of the child's home to the Basildon Upper Academy, measured by straight line distance*.

In the event of a tie in category '2', the Chair of Governors, supervised by an independent scrutineer, will draw names.

* For the purposes of criterion '2' the straight line distance will be measured from the address-point of the student's home to the address-point of the Upper Academy site, regardless of distance of travel. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet. Where a student lives for part of each week at different address, the 'home' address shall be that address which is the main family home and where the student spends the majority of the week.

Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available the following criteria will be applied in the given order:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet).
2. Children of teaching and non-teaching staff who have been directly employed by Beauchamps High School for two or more years at the time of application for admission to the school. Children of staff members who are recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage will also receive the same priority.
3. Children with a sibling[‡] attending the school.
4. Children whose registered main home address is in the priority admission area and has a postcode starting with SS11.
5. Children whose registered main home address is in the priority admission area and has a postcode starting with SS12.
6. Any remaining places will be allocated by straight line distance* from the child's main address to the school. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

In the event of oversubscription within any of the above criteria, straight line distance* will be used as a tie-breaker, with those living nearest to the school by straight line distance* having highest priority.

[‡] For applications made in the normal admission round a relevant sibling is defined as a child who has a brother, sister, adopted brother or adopted sister or stepbrother or stepsister living in the same family unit in the same family household and address, who attends the preferred school in any year group in the

year of admission. Biological and adopted siblings who attend the preferred school in any year group in the year of admission will also be treated as siblings, irrespective of place of residence. Children residing in the same household as part of an extended family, such as cousins, will not be treated as siblings.

* Straight line distance: This is measured from the address point of the home address to address point of the school. Distances are reported in miles to three decimal places. If a child's time is split equally between two residences, the address of the residence at which the child resides for the majority of the school week would be used to measure the distance between the child's school and home.

Admissions to Sixth Form

Admissions to the Sixth Form Year 12 students will be admitted to study only if they meet the entry requirements which are set out in our Sixth Form prospectus.

Oversubscription Criteria where the Sixth Form is oversubscribed: Existing Year 11 students applying for a Sixth Form place and external students applying to be admitted for the first time will be offered a place according to the school's existing Admission Arrangements.

In the event of over-subscription, priority for admission to the school will be determined by the Governing Body in accordance with the following criteria:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
2. children residing in the school's defined catchment area (a guidance map is available on the school website or priority admission areas can be checked using the Catchment Area Finder on the Essex County Council website);
3. children with a sibling[‡] attending the school*;
4. children attending (in Year 6 at time of application/determination) one of the following catchment area feeder schools:
 - Quilters Junior School
 - South Green Junior School
 - Sunnymede Primary School
 - St Peters RC Primary School, Billericay
5. children of staff at The Billericay School (this includes step children living at the permanent address of the member of staff) who fall under either or both of the following circumstances:
 - a)** where the member of staff has been employed at The Billericay School for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made; and/or;
 - b)** the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage;

6. distance from the home to school (based on straight line measurement) with those living nearer being accorded the higher priority. Distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

A separate admissions process exists for children with an Education, Health and Care Plan.

[‡] LA sibling definition applies.

* A relevant sibling who attends the school at the time of application with a reasonable expectation that the sibling will still be attending at the time of admission.

A sibling link to a child in Year 11 or Year 12 at the time of application will be taken to exist where there is a reasonable expectation that the child may return to the school for a post 16 course of study. Having an older sibling in Year 13 will not qualify an applicant for a sibling place.

Home address is considered to be the address at which the child resides on a permanent basis or is 'ordinarily resident' as detailed in the Secondary Education In Essex booklet.

Tie-break.

If a tie-break is required in any category to decide who has priority for admission between two children for the last available place, distance from the school will be used. In the unlikely event of distances being the same for two or more applicants, random allocation will be used to decide who has highest priority for admission. This process will be independently verified.

Waiting list held until: end of academic year.

Admissions to Sixth Form

Applications to the 6th form, from existing pupils or external applicants, must be made directly to the school on the school's application form. Entry requirements vary according to the course of study, full details of which are available in the school's 6th form brochure, which will be published in the previous academic year.

The Billericay School (continued)

The school will admit up to 50 “external” students in addition to those students who already attend the school, in accordance with the course-related entry requirements. In the event of over-subscription, priority will be determined by reference to average GCSE point score and achievement of the required grades in the chosen subjects.

Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied, in the order set out below, to decide which children to admit:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet).
2. Child(ren) of teaching and non-teaching staff who have been directly employed by the school for two or more years at the time of application for admission to the school. Children of staff members who are recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.
3. Where a child's main home address (at the time of application for admission to the school) is in the postcode town of Wickford*:
 - a) students who have siblings attending the school in all year groups (except Year 13) will be given priority over students who do not have siblings and will be offered in order of straight-line distance;
 - b) remaining students in the postcode town of Wickford without siblings will be offered in order of straight-line distance.
4. Where a child's main home address (at the time of application for admission to the school) is outside the postcode town of Wickford*:
 - a) students who have siblings attending the school in all year groups (except Year 13) will be given priority over students who do not have siblings and will be offered in order of straight-line distance;
 - b) remaining students outside of the postcode town of Wickford without siblings will be offered in order of straight-line distance.

Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

In the unlikely event of two applications with an identical distance competing for a single place at the school the place will be offered to one applicant on the basis of lots drawn by a School Governor not involved in admissions (supervised by an independent scrutineer).

*Postcodes for "postcode town of Wickford" are defined as SS11 and SS12 postcodes.

Siblings are defined as a child living in the same family unit, in the same family household and address as a child who attends the school at the time of application and determination and with a reasonable expectation that the sibling will be attending at the time of admission. Biological and adopted siblings who attend the school will also be treated as siblings irrespective of their place of residence. Children residing in the same household as part of an extended family, such as cousins, will not be treated as siblings.

Waiting list held until: end of autumn term.

Admission to the Sixth Form

The school is proposing to admit 100 in Year 12, including up to 15 who will be admitted for the first time in September 2025. Year 12 students will be admitted only if they meet the entry requirements for the pathway they wish to enrol on as set out in the Sixth Form prospectus. In addition, students must meet specific subject requirements detailed in the prospectus.

In the event of oversubscription, existing Year 11 students who meet the entry requirements will be given priority according to their rank order when the above oversubscription criteria are applied. If any places remain, the same oversubscription criteria will be applied to students seeking admissions to the school for the first time.

In the event of oversubscription places will be allocated using the following criteria in the order given:

1. Catholic* Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
2. Catholic children*;
3. other Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
4. Catechumens and members of an Eastern Christian Church;
5. Baptised children of other Christian denominations;
6. Children of staff at the school^;
7. Any other children.

Within each of the categories listed above, the following provisions will be applied in the following order:

- (i) The attendance of a brother or sister at the school at the time of enrolment will increase the priority of an application within each category so that the application will be placed at the top of the category in which the application is made.

A 'parent' means all natural parents, any person who is not a parent but has parental responsibility for a child, and any person who has care of a child.

Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

*'Catholic' means a member of a Church in full communion with the See of Rome. This includes the Eastern Catholic Churches. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of baptism in a Catholic Church or a certificate of reception into the full communion of the Catholic Church. For the purposes of this policy, it includes a looked after child who is part of a Catholic family where a letter from a priest demonstrates that the child would have been baptised or received if it were not for their status as a looked after child (e.g. a looked after child in the process of adoption by a Catholic family).

For a child to be treated as Catholic, evidence of baptism or reception into the Church will be required. Those who have difficulty obtaining written evidence of baptism should contact their Parish Priest who, after consulting with the Diocese, will decide how the question of baptism is to be resolved and how written evidence is to be produced in accordance with the laws of the Church.

'catechumen' means a member of the catechumenate of a Catholic Church. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of reception into the order of catechumens.

'Eastern Christian Church' includes Orthodox Churches, and is normally evidenced by a certificate of baptism or reception from the authorities of that Church.

The governing body reserves the right to withdraw the offer of a place or, where a child is already attending the school the place itself, where it is satisfied that the offer or place was obtained by deception.

"baptised children of other Christian denominations", normally evidenced by a certificate of baptism or reception from the authorities of that Church. An ecclesial community which on principle has no credal statements in its tradition, is included if it manifests faith in Christ as witnessed to in the Scriptures and is committed to working in the spirit of the above.

All members of Churches Together in England and CYTÛN are deemed to be included in the above definition, as are all other churches and ecclesial communities that are in membership of any local Churches Together Group (by whatever title) on the above basis.

Where the number of applications for admission exceeds the published admissions limit (i.e. the number of places available), places will be allocated by the Governing Body to the children of those parents who have expressed a preference for the school by submitting an application form by the published cut-off date and in accordance with the following criteria and in the following numbered order of priority:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);
2. children with a sibling# attending the school at the time of application;
3. children of staff gainfully employed by the school (any member of staff who has been employed for a minimum of two years, or to fulfil a vacancy in an area which is difficult to recruit). The member of staff must still be in the school's employment on the National Offer day of 3 March. Staff employed in the central team of Zenith Multi Academy Trust are entitled to a staff place at the secondary school closest to their home address;
4. where the child attends one of the partner primary schools of the Zenith Multi Academy Trust;
5. any remaining places will be allocated according to the distance* from the child's home address to the school.

Siblings are defined as children with a brother or sister (or a step brother/sister) living at the same address at the time the application is submitted, and there must be a reasonable expectation that the older child will still be at the school at the time the younger child is admitted. This does not apply for those with siblings in Year 11 at the time of the application.

* Distance from the child's home address to the school's address on Leinster Road will be measured in a straight line with those living nearer being accorded the higher priority. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

The home address is considered to be the address at which the child resides on a permanent basis. If the child lives at more than one address, it is the address of the parent/guardian that is in receipt of child benefit for the child that is considered as the home address. Verification may be required.

In the event of a tie-break for the distance criteria, the Governors' Committee will use the principle of drawing names out of a hat.

1. A “looked after child” or a child who was previously looked after, at the time of making an application to the school (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet).

A business address, a childminder’s address, or any address other than the child’s home will not be accepted. Proof of address will be sought and may be the subject of further investigation.

Where a child lives at more than one such address, the address will be where the child lives for the majority of the time. Where the child lives at more than one address and spends equal time at both, the home address will be counted as that at which the child is registered with their GP.

The school reserves the right to seek verification of the information parents have given on the application form and to withdraw the offer of a place if false information has been given. Admissions to Sixth Form

The capacity of the Sixth Form is 150 students in each of Year 12 and Year 13. A minimum of 35 places will be offered annually to external candidates. More places may be available external candidates, subject to uptake of places by internal students.

All Year 11 students who wish to stay at the school will be able to continue into the Sixth Form, subject to meeting the Academic Criteria, and their course requirements. We will offer advice, guidance and support to all of our students to ensure they are able to make informed choices about their post-16 education.

There are at least 35 places available to external applicants. External applicants wishing to be admitted to Year 12 must apply directly to the school prior to the closing date, using the online application form (or the hard copy form available on request from the school office). The closing date and full details of the application process will be published annually in the Sixth Form Prospectus and on the school's Sixth Form website www.becketkeys6th.org. The same Year 12 Academic Criteria and course requirements apply to both external and internal applicants, but if the external places are oversubscribed then they will be prioritised according to the Oversubscription Criteria.

All students in the Sixth Form at the school must be on a full-time study programme. This will usually comprise a minimum of three A-level courses or equivalent (full details of the options for full time study will be published annually in the Sixth Form Prospectus and on the school's Sixth Form website www.becketkeys6th.org).

There will be a minimum academic qualification for entry into the Sixth Form at the school and in addition, individual courses will have minimum entry requirements that must be met. Full details will be published each year in the Sixth Form Prospectus.

Meetings may be held with applicants and their parents to discuss options and courses but will not form part of the decision process on whether to offer a place. The school admits up to 17 places on a basis of musical aptitude. Priority will be given to those who show the most aptitude on assessment. Additional music training and activities will be provided by the school and these students will be expected to participate in these activities. Music aptitude assessment tests will take place in the Autumn term and you will be informed, before the school application deadline whether your daughter has passed. Please note that a pass does not equate to a guarantee of a place at the school. ‘sibling’ includes:

Anyone wishing to name CCHS on their CAF must have registered to sit the Entrance Test at CCHS. For a student to sit the Entrance Test, an online registration form via the school website must be completed. The registration window opens on Wednesday 24th April 2024 and closes at 4pm on Friday 21st June 2024. Registration for the test after the deadline will only be accepted in exceptional circumstances and considered on a case by case basis.

The test is normally available to girls in Essex and from outside the County aged at least eleven years and under twelve years on 31st August 2025. Children studying outside of their normal age group* can register and make an application. A decision on whether to offer them a place will be made by the School on a case-by-case basis taking into account the child's best interests. Parents must also make a formal application to their home Local Authority (LA) by the LA's published closing date of 31st October each year. Applicants who move to the area after the close of registration, for reasons that could not be foreseen, should contact the Admissions Office to be considered for sitting the Entrance Test on a later date.

The School acts at all times in accordance with the Equality Act 2010 and will therefore consider a request for all reasonable adjustments from the parents of any child with a disability or Special Educational Need who wishes to sit the Entrance Test. Parents should notify CCHS on the Registration Form if their child will need additional support in order to access the test. This

should ideally be provided at least 2 months before the test to enable the School to source any necessary resources for the Test. Any late requests for reasonable adjustments will be considered on a case by case basis.

Methods of application and the closing date for the receipt of applications will be published in the LA Secondary Education in Essex booklet for all parents of Year 6 girls, and will be available on the Chelmsford County High School for Girls website, the LA website and publicised by other means that the school may choose to employ e.g. direct mailing to primary schools and press advertisement.

It is preferable for applicants to register online; however paper registration is available on request.

The Entrance Test consists of 3 elements, English, Mathematics and Creative Writing. Children are expected to show ability appropriate to the Key Stage 2 curriculum. No additional preparation is necessary. A familiarisation paper will be made available on our website. A child may only take the test once.

The tests will normally take place early in the Autumn Term. The timeline and registration process are detailed in the Information Guide which is available for download from the School website from March 2024.

Applicants who wish to attend an entrance test for another school being held on the same day as the CCHS Entrance Test will not be permitted to sit the CCHS Entrance Test on an alternative day. This will not be deemed as an exceptional circumstance. Only one address can be used for the application. In applying these admission arrangements 'permanent home address' will be defined as the permanent place of residence of the parent with whom the girl spends the majority of the school week (Sunday to Thursday nights inclusive) at the time of application to the home local authority. The exception to this is if the family are returning from abroad to a previous permanent place of

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residence within the priority area* or are members of the Diplomatic Service or Armed Forces. Documentary evidence of this status will be required.

Documentary evidence of permanent home address will be required and will be considered on a case-by-case basis. This evidence can include documents showing owner occupancy or a valid letting contract of a residential property, a UK photocard driving licence showing the address, council tax bills and at least two current utility bills, which must include an electricity bill showing actual usage.

You will be informed of your daughter's entrance test result in mid-October. This will indicate if she has achieved an eligible score (see definitions Appendix 1). On the basis of this, you may wish to list CCHS as one of your preferences on the Common Application Form. Achieving an eligible score does NOT guarantee the offer of a place, as there are likely to be more children with eligible scores than places available.

Allocation of places on over-subscription

Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available in Year 7, places will be allocated in descending score order from the Ranked List of Applicants (who have not already been offered a place at a higher preference) in the order of priority listed below:

2. The applicant has an Educational Health Care Plan (EHCP) and has achieved an eligible score.
3. Of the next 144, places will be allocated as follows:
 - (a) up to 30 places will be made available to applicants in receipt of pupil or Service Premium, who has achieved a score up to 5 marks below an eligible score and are living at a permanent home address within the 12.5-mile priority area of the School. The offer of a place is conditional upon the applicant living within the priority area (at their permanent home address) **since 31st October in Year 6**, which is the deadline for formal applications to the Local Authority.
 - (b) the remaining places (of the 144) will be allocated to applicants that have achieved an eligible score and are living at a permanent home address within the 12.5-mile priority area of the School. The offer of a place is conditional upon the applicant living within the priority area (at their permanent home address) **since 31st October in Year 6**, which is the deadline for formal

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applications to the Local Authority.

4. All remaining places (up to 36) will be allocated in descending score order from the Ranked List of Applicants irrespective of where they permanently live until all 180 places are filled.

***Full definitions of the above are listed in the CCHS Supplementary Information Form (SIF) and Appendix 1 is available from the school.**

Parents will have 21 days from the date of the letter of offer to accept or decline the offer in writing. Where an offer has been either declined or not taken up within the 21 day period the LA will offer the place to the next eligible girl on the Ranked List of Applicants (subject to the same conditions and proportions as the preceding paragraphs). Where selected girls decline the offer of a place, the place will be offered to the next qualified girl(s) in rank order whose application expressed a preference for the school (subject to the same conditions and proportions as the preceding paragraphs).

This process will be operated until the 31st August 2026, when the Ranked List of Applicants waiting list will cease to apply and any further vacancies will be determined through the in-year application process.

If the applicant's permanent home address changes after 31st October 2024 and the change of address would result in a higher ranking, the new address will only be taken into account after the deadline from the Local Authority for accepting or declining a place and then re-ranked, if applicable, on the waiting list on 1st September 2025. Applicants will need to provide evidence that the previous home is no longer used by the family, for example, proof that the property has been sold or that it is no longer available for the family for example, proof that the property has been sold or that it is no longer available for the family to live in or that a rental agreement has ended.

If the applicant's permanent home address changes after 31st October 2024 and would result in a lower ranking, the new address will be taken into account immediately and the applicant re-ranked accordingly.

CCHS will also check the child's permanent home address once offers have been made at the time of admission. If it is different from the application address

then further checks will be carried out. This will include consideration as to whether or not the address used to make an application was purely used to secure a school place, as this may be considered fraudulent or intentionally misleading.

Where there is a tie for the last available place, due to applicants achieving identical standardised aggregate test scores, preference will first be given to an applicant who lives closest to the school by straight line measurement to the permanent home address by way of electronic measurement. In the unlikely event of two applicants with an identical distance competing for a single place, the place will be offered to one applicant on the basis of lots drawn by an independent person.

Any parents whose daughter is not successful in obtaining a place will be notified of their right of appeal to an Independent Appeal Panel.

Admissions to Sixth Form

Chelmsford County High School for Girls intends to admit 30 girls into Year 12 in addition to those progressing from Year 11 at CCHS.

External applicants will be admitted provided they have met the minimum entry requirements and where the availability of places in subject courses, the availability of teaching staff, the suitability of group sizes and the pastoral capacity of the school permit. Applications will be refused where the School considers the size of teaching sets or tutor groups necessary would prejudice the efficient education of the group and where it is not financially or educationally desirable for the Governors to alter the balance of the School's staffing or to appoint additional staff.

The GCSE criteria below apply equally to internal students and to external applicants. However internal students will be offered places (provided they meet these criteria) before places are offered to external applicants.

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Admission to the Sixth Form is based on GCSE/IGCSE grades attained in full courses. Students with non-standard qualifications will be assessed separately and the equivalency of other qualifications obtained will be taken into consideration.

Minimum entry requirements

- All candidates are required to have reformed grade 6 or higher, or grade B or higher in GCSE/IGCSE English Language and Mathematics.
- All candidates must achieve an average of at least 6.625 over their best eight GCSE grades, including English Language and Mathematics. This average should be calculated (according to guidance issued by the DfE) by converting the grades for English Language, Mathematics and the six highest GCSE results as follows:
Reformed GCSE Grading: 9=9, 8=8, 7=7, 6=6, 5=5, 4=4
Unreformed GCSE Grading: A*=8.5, A=7, B=5.5, C=4
- Short or half courses will not be considered in the above calculation.
- The only dual awards to be considered will be dual award Science and dual award Engineering.
- Dual awards will be counted as one GCSE and, where applicable, the grade used in the calculation will be the one scored in the higher paper. e.g. the additional science grade.
- Only two qualifications per subject will be accepted e.g. the grades for GCSE Mathematics and GCSE Statistics could be included in the average grade calculation but a third Maths result would not be included.
- In addition to the above entry requirements, students are, in general, expected to achieve reformed grade 7 or higher, or unreformed IGCSE equivalent, in the subjects they intend to study at A level. Requirements for individual subjects are shown in the A level Subjects Booklets.
- Students wishing to study two or more of Maths/Biology/Chemistry/Physics require at least one 8 in one of those subjects.

In the event of over-subscription when there are more external applicants who satisfy the entry requirements above than there are places available priority will be given in the following order:

1. Students who are 'Looked After' or 'Previously Looked After' children who meet the admission criteria.

2. Other students who meet the admission criteria.

Each individual applicant must meet the same admission criteria, and places will be offered in descending rank order of their average GCSE points score across their best eight GCSE/IGCSE qualifications as outlined above and given the availability of places in the teaching sets for each subject they wish to study. In the case of a tie, the results of GCSEs beyond the eighth subject will be taken into account, using the higher average point score of nine subjects, then ten subjects etc, until the tie is resolved.

Further Requirements

- The student must be under 17 years of age on 31st August of the calendar year of proposed admission.
- The student must be able to demonstrate to the School's satisfaction that she has a right to reside in the United Kingdom and is entitled to State Education.
- The student will not be admitted to the school until she has provided authentic, valid and bona fide documentation in support of her application, including documentation to confirm her GCSE results.
- The student will need to be a proficient English speaker to cope with the pace of the academic curriculum on offer at this school. With the exception of Modern Foreign language classes, lessons are taught in English so if a student's first language is not English, the School may require her to demonstrate the fluency, both orally and in writing, necessary for her to participate successfully in the Sixth Form.

Students new to CCHS will need to complete the Application Form, while returning Year 11 students will be required to fill in an Options Form.

Interviewing does not form part of our admissions process but we may invite students for an options discussion where necessary.

The closing date for applications is **Friday 14th February 2025**.

All prospective Sixth Formers will be invited to participate in the Induction programme which takes place in June. Offers of places in the Sixth Form are made and confirmed when GCSE results are published; for equal consideration students must upload their

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results to the CCHS admissions website by 1200 BST on GCSE Results Day. If the school is able to offer them a place they will subsequently be contacted by telephone for a verbal offer to be made. They will need to confirm their place by email immediately after this conversation has taken place.

Where students applying to the Sixth Form do not have standard GCSE or IGCSE qualifications, applications are considered on an individual basis and students may be asked to sit specific tests in school. Student qualifications will be considered along with other information provided by the student's current school, in an attempt to make a fair assessment of the application. This process is entirely at the discretion of the Governing Body. Students may find it helpful to consult NARIC, (the National Agency responsible for providing information and expert opinion on academic qualifications from overseas), to obtain the necessary information.

3. children of staff at the school where the member of staff has been employed for a minimum of two years at the time of application or where a member of staff is recruited to fill a vacancy for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage;
4. children living in the priority admission area; children attending a primary school within the priority admission area (Beehive Lane, Larkrise, St. Michael's, Meadgate); plus, children attending Barnes Farm, Chancellor Park and St. Andrew's, Hatfield Peverel. The selection test and eligibility for entry to Year 7

- (a) There will be one selection test for those schools that are members of the CSSE (Consortium of selective schools in Essex). This will save children whose parents or carers express a preference for more than one selective school in the CSSE from taking multiple tests for those schools.
- (b) The number intended to admit to King Edward VI Grammar School is 150.
- (c) Parents or carers must register their child with the CSSE by the closing date for registration to sit the test.
- (d) The test is normally available to children registered in Year 6 from the start of the academic year in which the test is to be taken and who are aged 11 years but under 12 years of age on the following 31st August, immediately prior to admission in September. For applicants who are outside of this age range, the school will follow the procedures set out by the CSSE to determine whether or not an 'over age' or 'under age' applicant will be permitted to sit the test. Please contact the CSSE, www.csse.org.uk, for further details.
- (e) Parents or carers must complete both the CSSE registration form and submit this to the CSSE by its closing date (see www.csse.org.uk) as well as submitting a formal Common Application Form to their home local authority. The closing date for applications is 31st October each year. Further information about how to register for the test can be obtained from the CSSE (see www.csse.org.uk).
- (f) Only boys who have been entered for the test, are of the appropriate age and who attain the required standard in the prescribed arrangements for selection

by reference to ability and aptitude will be eligible to be considered for admission to King Edward VI Grammar School in the September of Year 7. The test is available to pupils in Essex and from outside the County.

(g) The selection process for the standard number of 150 is by two exam papers in English and Mathematics. The papers will be marked by staff employed by the school and a mark aggregated for each applicant. The CSSE will determine what age adjustment, if any, should be applied to the 11+ scores.

(h) Applicants who are ill, or through other special circumstances are unable to take the test on the main date, will be allowed to sit a test on another stated day at a stated venue as determined by the CSSE, subject, in the case of illness to the provision of a medical certificate, and, in any other circumstances to a written explanation of the circumstances. Further details can be found in the Access Arrangements document provided by the CSSE on their website.

(i) This process is subject to regular review.

Venue of the test for Year 7 entry

- (a) The test will be taken at a selective school or other designated centre. Normally applicants for King Edward VI Grammar School will take the test at the school or other local site which the school may use. If maximum candidate capacity at KEGS is reached, the CSSE will offer applicants an alternative test centre, sometimes on a different day. All UK candidates must sit the test at a CSSE centre.
- (b) In the interests of fairness, no applicant will take the test at his own school except as described in (c) below where no alternative is available.
- (c) Applicants intending to move to Essex for the start of their child's Year 7 education, but who currently live abroad, will take the test on the main test date at a place to be decided in consultation with the CSSE and the applicant's parents or carers.

Date of the test for Year 7 entry

The main date for the test for the September entry will normally be a Saturday in the first half of the Autumn term except for variations described above.

Over-subscription for entry in Year 7

- (a) 150 places are available to those who made KEGS one of their preferences, who have not been offered a place at another school for which they expressed a higher preference, and who qualify to be offered a place at the school under the coordinated admissions

arrangements. Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available in Year 7, places will be awarded in rank order from the test, using standardised scores (including age standardisation).

Places that are dependent on living continuously in the 'Priority Area'

120 places are reserved for boys who have been **continuously** living within the priority area, i.e. within a distance of 12.5 miles from the school (see section 4(b)-(c) and section 5 below), **since 31st October in year 6:**

(i) Up to 8 out of the 120 'priority area' places are available to the top performing boys in the selection test who fulfil all of the following criteria:

- A.** at the time of test registration, are EITHER in receipt of the Pupil Premium payment OR are classified as 'looked after' children or 'previously looked after' children or 'internationally adopted previously looked after children'. In each case, this must be declared on the CSSE Supplementary Information Form when registering for the tests (evidence will be required);
- B.** achieved a final standardised score of at least 340

(ii) Further places will be offered in descending rank order of marks to the boys up until 120 places have been awarded to priority area applicants (this total includes any places awarded in 4(i) above).

Places not dependent on living in the 'Priority Area'

Once 120 places have been allocated to boys living inside the 'priority area', the remaining 30 places will be allocated to boys regardless of where they live:

(iii) Up to 2 of these 30 places are available to the top performing boys in the selection test who fulfil all of the following criteria:

- A.** at the time of test registration, are EITHER in receipt of the Pupil Premium payment OR are classified as 'looked after' children or 'previously looked after' children or 'internationally adopted previously looked after children'. In each case, this must be declared on the CSSE Supplementary Information Form when registering for the test (evidence will be required);

B. achieved a final standardised score of at least 350.

(iv) The remaining places from the 30 will then be offered in descending rank order of marks to the boys scoring highest in the selection test.

(b) The offer of a place made under 4(a)(i) and 4(a)(ii) is conditional upon the pupil being continuously resident within the priority area (at their permanent home address and that of their primary carer) between 31st October in Year 6 and the date of commencing the start of Year 7 at KEGS.

(c) Only one address can be used for application. In applying these admission arrangements, the 'permanent home address' will be defined as the place where the child resides for the majority of the week (Sunday to Thursday nights inclusive) and where their primary carer normally resides. Permanent residency is defined as owner occupancy or valid letting contract of a residential property. If a family rents a property, or lives with relatives temporarily, and uses this address in order to try to gain a priority area school place, whilst retaining ownership or tenancy of an alternative property, then the latter property will normally be considered as the appropriate address to assess admission from, even if this property is not currently being occupied by the child and their primary carer. For all applications, evidence of residence at the address may be required.

(d) Children of returning UK service personnel and crown servants (or who are posted to the priority area) will be treated as meeting the residency requirement in 4(b) above. Documentary evidence will be required.

(e) Where selected pupils drop out between the time of publication of offers of places and the start of the following academic year places, then:

(i) any pupil who drops out who was awarded a place on the basis of categories 4(a)(i) and 4(a)(ii) above (i.e. who lives within the priority area) will be replaced by the next pupil in rank order who lives in the priority area as defined in 4(b)-(c).

(ii) any pupil who drops out who was awarded a place on the basis of categories 4(a)(iii) and 4(a)(iv) above will be replaced by the next pupil in the rank order.

(f) Where there are a number of pupils with equal scores competing for the last available place, due to applicants achieving identical standardised test scores (including age standardisation), preference will first of all be given to "looked after" or "previously looked after" children or 'internationally adopted previously

looked after children', then to those in receipt of Pupil Premium (evidence will be required). Should there still be a tie for the last available place, preference will then be given to the pupil(s) who live closest to the school by straight-line measurement. In the unlikely event of two applicants with an identical distance competing for a single place, the place will be offered to one applicant on the basis of lots drawn by an independent person.

(g) A waiting list of the remaining pupils who took the selection test, will be held by the school for one year following admission to Year 7. If a pupil leaves KEGS during Year 7 then an offer of a place will be made according to the procedure in 4(e) above. If an application is received for a place in Year 7 after the normal admissions round, then the school will respond within 15 school days to advise parents of the next available test date or the reason for refusal with information about the right of appeal.

(h) Parents or carers will have 21 days from the date of the letter of offer to accept or decline the offer in writing. Where an offer has not been taken up within the 21-day period, the school reserves the right to withdraw the offer and to offer the place to the next eligible applicant.

Calculation of straight-line distances

All straight-line distances are calculated electronically by the Local Authority using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey. The data is used to plot the coordinates of each individual property and school and provides the address points between which straight-line distance is measured. Distances are reported in miles to three decimal places in the first instance.

Address checking

The school may ask applicants to provide proof of their home address. This must be a copy of the following:

- UK driving licence (if applicable);
- Council tax notification; and
- Two utility bills dates within the last six months (gas, electricity, water or landline telephone).

Fraudulent / Misleading Applications

Regrettably, on occasion some parents give false information about their home address to get a place at a particular school. This is unacceptable and has the effect of denying a place to a child with a more genuine claim. The school expects that all applications are

made in good faith, giving the correct information.

Where there is reasonable doubt as to the validity of a home address, the school reserves the right to undertake additional checking measures, including in some cases, unannounced home visits. If a school place is secured through false information regarding a home address, the school reserves the right to withdraw the place and will exercise that right in relevant cases.

Admissions to Sixth Form

- a) External applicants for Sixth Form places comprise all genders without bias. The Priority Area criterion does not apply to the Sixth Form, ie. admission is based solely on GCSE results as outlined below. Except in exceptional circumstances, students must be under 17 years of age on 31st August of the calendar year of proposed admission.
- b) The morning of the day GCSE results are released at the end of Year 11 is the latest time for receipt of an application if the applicant is to be considered equally alongside all other candidates.
- c) All applicants will be asked to specify their intended subject choices, upon which the school will determine the projected number of teaching groups for each subject. Interviewing applicants or their families for entry to Year 12 will not take place, although meetings can be held to provide advice on options and entry requirements for particular courses.
- d) Admission by any applicant to the Sixth Form is based on GCSE or IGCSE grades in full courses and AS levels or FSMQ Additional Mathematics at

grades A and B only. The equivalency of other qualifications obtained will be taken into consideration.

- e) The minimum number of external applicants likely to be admitted is 50. The upper limit of Year 12 external applicants will be based, not on total Year 12 numbers projected for the following academic year, but on the projected size of the teaching groups and the pastoral capacity of the school. Taking into account choices for A Level study, applications will be refused where the school considers the size of teaching sets or tutor groups to be detrimental to the education of the group and where it is not financially or educationally desirable for the Governors to alter the balance of the school's staffing or to appoint additional staff.

- f) The requirements for admission into Year 12 are:

1. an average GCSE/IGCSE points score of at least 6.625 across **the best eight subjects**.
This will be calculated as follows:
Reformed GCSEs (graded 9 to 1) will score according to the grade i.e. a grade 7 would score 7 points for KEGS admission purposes.
Unreformed GCSEs (graded A* to G) will score A* = 8.5 points, A = 7 points, B = 5.5 points, C = 4 points.
AS B grade or above = 8.5 points and FSMQ Additional Mathematics B grade or above = 8.5 points.
2. Reformed grade 6 or higher **must** be achieved in GCSE Mathematics and English (whether or not these subjects are being followed to A Level). The English GCSE may be either English Language or English Literature.
3. A suitably high GCSE grade, **usually** reformed grade 7 or A or better, in each chosen subject of study. An 8 or higher is usually required to study A Level Mathematics; a 9 is usually required to study Further Maths.
4. Reformed grade 4 or higher must be achieved at GCSE in a modern foreign language.
5. **There need to be available places** in the teaching sets for each subject.
6. Only two qualifications per subject are accepted e.g. FSMQ Additional Maths (of B or above) + Maths GCSE, but not GCSE Statistics + GCSE Maths + FSMQ Additional Maths.

7. Applicants who have previously left KEGS for disciplinary reasons, either through a managed move or a permanent exclusion, will be treated as "external" candidates.
- g) All qualifications to be considered in (f) above must have been completed and graded by the end of GCSE Results Day immediately before entering the Sixth Form.
- h) In cases of over subscription, places will be offered first to all internal applicants then to external applicants. Each individual applicant must meet the same admission criteria, and places will be offered in descending rank order of their average points score across eight qualifying qualifications. In the event of tied scores, places will be offered first to 'looked after' children or 'previously looked after' or 'internationally adopted previously looked after children' or those formerly in receipt of Pupil Premium who meet the criteria above. If there is still a tie after applying this criterion, places will be offered on the basis of the average points score across nine qualifying qualifications. If these scores are tied, then the best ten will be compared and so on. The school will also strive to maximize the viability of each pre-published A Level course running and, if appropriate, will occasionally prioritise applications from students who wish to study one or more of the courses with fewer students.

Appeals

To enter for the test a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) must be obtained from, completed and returned to The Secretary to the CSSE (address available from the school). Applications may also be made online.

An additional form for those candidates in receipt of free school meals by virtue of their household income at the agreed government threshold * or for whom their primary school receives the pupil premium** or receive the Service Pupil Premium (SPP)*** must be completed and returned to Colchester County High School for Girls by 31 October 2024. The School will seek written verification of this information from each candidate's primary school, with parental permission. The eligibility will be taken to be as on the date the test is taken.

*This does not apply to students who receive free school meals only due to the universal free school meals policy by the Local Authority.

**Children eligible for the pupil premium:

1. Looked after children.
2. Previously looked after children.
3. Children currently eligible for free school meals by virtue of their household income at the agreed government threshold.
4. Children who are known to have been eligible for free school meals by virtue of their household income at the agreed government threshold at any point in the last 6 years from the date the test is taken.

***Students attract Service Pupil Premium (SPP) at CCHSG if they meet one of the following criteria:

- one of their parents is serving in the regular armed forces (including pupils with a parent who is on full commitment as part of the full time reserve service);
- they have been registered as a 'service child' on a school census since 2016;
- one of their parents died whilst serving in the armed forces and the pupil receives a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme or the War Pensions Scheme.

The test is normally available to girls in Essex and from outside the county aged at least eleven years and under twelve years on 31 August following the taking of the test, who make application via the CSSE by the published cut-off date. No girls who will be younger than eleven years of age on 31 August following the taking of the test will be eligible for admission unless they fulfil the LA's criteria for early entry – i.e. they are following the full Year 6 curriculum in the year in which they take the test. No student who will be twelve years of age or over on 1 September following the test date will be allowed to take the test and gain admission to Year 7 at Colchester County High School for Girls, unless there are verified exceptional circumstances. Only girls who have been entered for the test, are of the appropriate age, and who attain the required standard in the prescribed arrangements for selection by reference to ability will be eligible to be considered for entry to the school in the September of Year 7.

The applicant must be able to demonstrate to the school's satisfaction that she has a right to reside in the United Kingdom and is entitled to state education

The selection process is by two tests, in English (50%) and Mathematics (50%). The English paper will comprise of comprehension, grammar and vocabulary, creative/extended writing, and applied reasoning (literacy and verbal). The Mathematics paper will

comprise of questions consistent with KS2 National curriculum and applied reasoning (mathematical/non-verbal). The English and Mathematics tests will be set by the Consortium or anybody they choose to act on their behalf. Practice papers are available from the CSSE. The tests will be marked by staff employed by the selective schools and the marks from the two tests will be aggregated and mathematically standardised for each candidate. A rank order of merit of all candidates seeking a selective place will be created.

The test can only be taken once by any candidate.

The main test date for September 2025 entry will take place on a date arranged by the CSSE.

Applicants intending to move to Essex for the start of their child's Year 7 education, but who currently live in the UK, must travel to take the test at a CSSE test centre. Applicants who live overseas should contact the CSSE regarding arrangements to take the tests on the main test date at a place to be decided by the CSSE in consultation with the applicant's parents.

Applicants, whose move to the area could not be foreseen in time to meet application deadlines, will be permitted to take a test at a later date decided by CSSE. The applicant will be placed in the Rank Order of Merit List containing candidates regardless of where the girls live and the details passed to the LA. If offers of places up to the PAN have already been made by the LA. If a place then becomes available within the number intended to admit, it will be offered (via the LA) to the late applicant by virtue of having a higher qualifying score than the next student on the rank order. The Local Authority will inform late applicants of their statutory right of appeal if a place is refused.

Following the tests, parents will be sent the test results for their daughter and information regarding the lowest cut off score for admission in previous years. However these scores are not a final indicator of applicant admission success as they may vary from year to year.

Oversubscription Criteria

If the school is oversubscribed after the admission of children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) which names Colchester County High School for Girls on the EHCP who score 320 or above admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below in order:

1. Looked after children or previously looked after (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet) who score 320 or above in the selection test;
2. Up to 20 places will be available to the highest scoring applicants who are eligible for the pupil premium (i.e. those in receipt of free schools meals by virtue of their household income at the agreed government threshold either currently or have received free school meals by virtue of their household income at the agreed government threshold in the previous 6 years, for whom their primary school receives the pupil premium) who achieve a test score of 320 or more;
3. Up to 10 places will be available to the highest scoring applicants who are eligible for the Service Pupil Premium (SPP) who achieve a score of 320 or above and live at a permanent home address within the priority area[^].
4. Places will then be allocated in descending score order from the Rank Order of Merit List, highest scoring first, for girls who permanently live within the priority area[^] until 154 places have been allocated from the combination of the above criteria in 1-4.
5. The remaining 38 places will then be allocated in descending score order from the Rank Order of Merit List, highest scoring first, regardless of where the girls live.

[^] The priority area for CCHSG is defined as 25 miles from the school, in a straight line. All straight line distances, are calculated electronically by the Local Authority using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey. The data is used to plot the coordinates of each individual property and school and provides the address points between which straight line distance is measured. Distances are reported in miles to three decimal places in the first instance.

The offer of a priority area place is conditional upon the applicant continuously living in their permanent home address in the priority area between the dates of 31 October 2024, which is the deadline for applications to the Local Authority (LA), and the start date for Year 7 at CCHSG in September 2025.

If CCHSG considers, acting reasonably, that on the balance of probabilities (more than 50% likely), that the property being occupied on an informal letting arrangement is so occupied predominantly for the purpose of increasing the applicant's chances at gaining a place at CCHSG, then CCHSG reserves the right to refuse admission or withdraw a school place. As below, the school reserves the right to undertake additional checks to establish the permanent home address of an applicant.

If, in addition to a rented property, the child's parents also own another property and have previously resided in that property, the School will consider whether the application for a school place has been made in good faith. Admissions to Sixth Form

The school plans to admit up to a maximum of 50 students (girls) joining from other schools in addition to those progressing from Colchester County High School for Girls provided they have met the minimum entry requirements and there is availability of places in subject courses, teaching staff and group sizes. The priority area criteria does not apply to the Sixth Form.

The deadline for submitting applications for sixth form places will be published on the website.

The School will acknowledge receipt of applications from external applicants and will request a reference, including predicted GCSE grades or any GCSE grades already achieved, from the applicant's current school. Where predicted grades are not provided by the school, performance in trial/mock examinations will be

considered and the professional judgement of staff at Colchester County High School will be used to make an assessment of the information provided.

The programme of study in the Sixth Form is that students will study three, four or five A Levels in Year 12. Students may study Further Mathematics within the four course choices or in addition to a four A Level programme.

Offers of conditional places will be made after the closing application date. The school will determine the projected number of teaching groups based on the applicant subject choices and conditional offers will be based on these choices.

More conditional places will be offered than places available as some applicants will not achieve the minimum entry criteria or will decide to attend an alternative Sixth Form provider. Taking into account subject choices for A Level study, applications will be declined or placed on a waiting list where the school considers the size of teaching groups to be detrimental to the education of the group (or groups) as a whole and where it is not financially or educationally desirable for the Governing Body to alter the balance of the school's staffing or appoint additional staff to create additional groups.

GCSE results will be verified on results day for both internal and external applicants; external candidates will be required to bring their results to the school on results day. Places in the Sixth Form will be confirmed by email within five working days after the GCSE results are published.

Places in the Sixth Form and course choices are confirmed on the basis of GCSE results and meeting the entry criteria, the availability of places in subject courses, group sizes and availability of teaching staff.

The minimum entry requirement is 4 GCSEs at Grade 7 or above and 2 GCSEs at Grade 6 including English Language and Mathematics at a minimum of Grade 6. Students will be required to achieve at least a Grade 7 in each GCSE subject they wish to study at A Level. Those students wishing to take A Level Music will also require Associated Board Grade 5 Music Theory and Associated Board Grade 5 Music Practical in addition to the GCSE grade requirements outlined above.

For A Level subjects not studied at GCSE, each subject has a specified entry qualification:

- for Classical Civilisation, Economics or Religious

Education a Grade 6 in GCSE English Language or GCSE English Literature

- for Psychology a Grade 7 in GCSE English Language or English Literature and Grade 6 in Mathematics
- for Further Mathematics a Grade 8 or above in GCSE Mathematics.
- for PE a Grade 7 in Biology. The practical assessment in A Level PE is not part of the taught course. It is therefore expected that students are competing at a high level in an AQA recognised sport (see AQA website) outside school.
- for Computer Science, an equivalent level 2 IT or Computer Science qualification.

If Economics, Psychology or Religious Education has been studied at GCSE then the entry requirement will be a Grade 7 in the subject to be taken at A Level.

The criteria above are minimum entry requirements. Achievement of the GCSE grades specified does not guarantee a place on any course or combination of courses as this is dependent on numbers in the teaching groups.

In addition to the GCSE requirements set out, where a candidate's first language is not English, the school may require her to demonstrate sufficient fluency in English, both orally and in writing, to participate successfully in the Sixth Form. The candidate must also be able to show to the school's satisfaction that she has a right to reside in the United Kingdom and is entitled to State Education. The school will refuse admission to any candidate who fails to provide authentic, valid and bona fide documentation in support of their application.

Where students applying to the Sixth Form do not have GCSE or IGCSE qualifications, applications are considered on an individual basis and will involve the candidate taking a test for each A Level subject set by the Head of Department. Student qualifications will be considered along with other information provided by the student's current school. Students must be under 17 years of age on 31 August of the calendar year of admission.

If the school is oversubscribed admission will be given to those children who meet the entry requirements in order:

1. applicants who are currently Looked After Children (LAC) or Previously Looked After Children (PLAC) as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet);

2. internal applicants;
3. applicants from the Alpha Trust secondary schools;
4. all other applicants.

Places will then be confirmed in descending rank order of students average GCSE grade across their highest grades for their **best eight full course GCSE subjects including English and Mathematics**. Dual awards will be counted as one GCSE and, where applicable, the grade used in the calculation will be the one scored in the higher paper for example the additional science grade.

Grades from unreformed GCSE's will be treated as follows:

A* = 8.5 points, A = 7 points, B = 5.5 points, C = 4 points. Grades below C or 4 points are not considered.

If there is a tie then GCSEs in addition to the eighth subject will be taken into account. Short or half courses will not be taken into account. In the event of a tie for one remaining place to study a particular combination of subjects between students with the same average GCSE points score across all of their subjects, the place will be offered to the student who lives nearest to the school by straight line measurement, measured from the school.

An applicant considering joining from another school would not be offered a place if the school considered that their addition to a teaching group (or groups) would increase the size of it (or them) to the detriment of the group (or groups) as a whole and it is not financially or educationally desirable for the Governors to alter the balance of the school's staffing or appoint additional staff to create additional groups.

Admissions Policy

You must always ensure that you have checked any testing dates or arrangements on the CSSE website and/or the school website.

Admission to Year 7 is determined by a pupil's position within the selection procedure organised by the Consortium of Selective Schools in Essex (CSSE). This position is decided on the basis of the pupil's standardized score in the selection tests. The selection procedure is open equally to pupils in Essex and those who live outside the county. Testing now takes place before application, and applicants to CRGS must register with the CSSE to take the selection tests by the official registration deadline. The main test date for September 2025 entry will take place on a date arranged by the CSSE. Applications must be submitted to the pupil's home LA by the published deadline of 31st October in the year prior to admission.

Admissions Priority 1:

Up to 12 places will be offered to boys who have named CRGS as a preferred school and who qualify to be offered a place at the school under the coordinated admissions arrangements, who achieve a score greater than 320 in the selection tests and who fall into any of the following categories:

- a 'looked after child' or previously looked after child;
- a child in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant (i.e. one who is in receipt of Free School Meals currently, or has received Free School Meals in the previous six years, whose primary school receives the Pupil Premium Grant) at the time of registration for the 11+ test (i.e. the CSSE registration period in the Summer Term prior to the main 11+ test date).

Priority will be given to applicants who are a 'looked after child' or previously looked after child (see note below). The places will be allocated based on descending rank order of marks, until either 12 places have been allocated or there are no more boys who fall into this category and have achieved a score greater than 320.

The remaining places (of the 12 earmarked for Admissions Priority 1) will be allocated to applicants who are in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant who meet the aforementioned conditions. The places will be allocated based on descending rank order or marks, until either a total of 12 places have been allocated or there are no more boys who fall into this category and have achieved a score greater than 320.

In both of these cases, the information must be declared on the CSSE registration form for the tests; evidence to confirm eligibility will subsequently be sought.

Admissions Priority 2:

The remaining places will then be offered in descending rank order of marks to the boys scoring highest in the selection tests who have named CRGS as a preferred school and who qualify to be offered a place at the school under the coordinated admissions arrangements until the PAN of 128 is reached.

If there are applicants with an equal ranking competing for the last available place in either Admissions Priority category, preference will be given to:

- a 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after;
- followed by a child in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant at the time of registration for the 11+ test (i.e. one who is in receipt of Free School Meals currently, or has received Free School Meals in the previous six years, whose primary school receives the Pupil Premium Grant);
- followed by the applicant living closest to the school by straight line distance as defined by the LA and set out in the Secondary Education in Essex Booklet.

The published admission number for Year 7 is 128. Application to CRGS is open to boys registered in Year 6 and under twelve years of age on the following 31st August, immediately prior to admission in September. The test can only be taken once by any pupil.

The school does not normally admit 'over age' applicants. Any test candidate who is 'under age' or 'over age' will need to demonstrate that their application is supported by the necessary relevant evidence. A panel of Headteachers, selected from the Consortium Schools and with full delegated authority from those schools, will review all 'under age' and 'over age' applications. The panel's decision is binding. For further information on 'under age' and 'over age' applicants, please see the CSSE document 'Arrangements for 'under age' and 'over age' entry to CSSE schools' that is available on the CSSE website (www.csse.org.uk).

If a place has been offered, but is then subsequently declined, a new offer will be made to whichever applicant has the next highest score in the same Admissions Priority category, provided the conditions outlined above are met. If there are no more applicants who meet the conditions for Admissions Priority category 1, then the place will be offered to the next highest scoring applicant from Admissions Priority category 2.

Admissions to Sixth Form

In addition to those who progress from the Colchester Royal Grammar School Year 11 cohort, a number of external students, both boys and girls, are admitted into Year 12 each year. A number of additional places are reserved for boarders.

All students must be under 17 years of age on 31st August of the calendar year of proposed admission, or be progressing directly from Year 11 to Year 12. Students from overseas, who do not follow the National Curriculum and whose age might fall outside this limit due to the educational system followed, will be considered on an individual basis.

Offers of places are made subject to satisfactory performance at GCSE or equivalent examination. The minimum requirement for entry into the Sixth Form is at least 38 points across the best five subjects. Reformed GCSEs will score according to their numerical grade; unreformed GCSEs will score as follows: A* = 8.5 points, A = 7 points, B = 5.5 points, C = 4 points. Grades below a C are not considered. AS grade B or above = 8.5 points.

A grade 7 (or above) is required in the subjects to be studied at A level. A reformed grade 5 or above must be achieved in GCSE (or GCSE equivalent, as defined by the DfE) English Language and Mathematics, regardless of whether or not these subjects are being followed at A level. A reformed grade 8 in GCSE Mathematics is required for anyone wishing to study Further Mathematics at A level.

Priority will be given to existing CRGS pupils transferring from Year 11 who meet the admissions criteria stated above. External students must complete and submit the school's official application form by 1st December, which can be found on the school's website. Predicted GCSE grades will be requested from the applicants' schools. Where predicted grades are not provided by the school, performance in trial examinations will be considered instead of the predicted grades, and the professional judgement of the CRGS staff will be used to make an assessment of the data provided. Applicants who are predicted high grades at GCSE or in equivalent single subject examinations will be invited to the school to discuss their subject choices, although this meeting will not form part of the selection process. Where some GCSE grades have already been achieved, the actual grades will be taken into account.

Colchester Royal Grammar School (continued)

Students from overseas who do not follow the National Curriculum are admitted on the basis of their academic performance in their current school and, where appropriate, their performance in the school's entrance tests. The professional judgement of the CRGS staff will be used to compare this information with the information provided on other applicants. Students from overseas, who do not follow the National Curriculum and who do not have reformed GCSEs (or GCSE equivalent, as defined by the DfE) in English Language and Mathematics, will be expected to study towards and pass these qualifications before the end of their A level courses, unless taking a higher level equivalent at A level.

Conditional places will then be offered to those students with the highest average points score, based on predicted grades, in their best 8 GCSEs or equivalents, including English and Mathematics. If students have an equal average points score, the number of grade 9s (or A* grades for unreformed GCSEs), predicted or achieved will be used to differentiate between candidates if necessary. Taking into account choices for A level study, applications will be declined or placed on a waiting list where the school considers the size of teaching sets to be detrimental to the education of the group and where it is not financially or educationally desirable for the Governors to alter the balance of the school's staffing or to appoint additional staff.

In cases of oversubscription, and if further discrimination is necessary, first preference will be given to looked-after or previously looked-after children who meet the grade requirements. Following this, preference will be given to applicants living closest to the school by straight line as defined by the LA. Decisions will be made and communicated to applicants by the end of February Half Term.

Applications received after 1st December will be considered after the first tranche of offers have been made. Any vacancies arising in the Summer Term will be filled in August on the basis of the actual GCSE results achieved, following the same criteria as detailed above.

In the case of boarding applicants an interview will be held to seek to establish whether the applicant is suitable for a boarding place.

Overseas applicants must hold a full British or EU passport, subject to changes in national legislation, or have residency rights in the UK. All applications to the Sixth Form should be submitted to the school by 1 December.

Where the distance measure is the same for two or more applicants (except for twins and children from multiple births), the final tie-breaker will be random allocation, which will be independently verified.

Distance will be measured by a straight line from the Ordnance Survey address point of the applicant's residence to the Thorpe Campus'. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

Admissions to Sixth Form

Admissions Policy

Admissions numbers: The school has an admissions number of 270 for entry into Year 7. 60 of these places are automatically reserved for pupils on roll in Year 6 of the school's primary phase; if unallocated these will be used for the remaining criteria. The remaining 210 places are available to external applicants.

When the school is oversubscribed, after the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care plan or a Statement of Special Educational Needs naming the school, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet).
2. Children with a sibling attending the school. A relevant sibling is a child who has a brother, sister, adopted brother or sister or stepbrother or stepsister living in the same family unit in the same family household and address who attends The Helena Romanes School in any year group when the child starts school, irrespective of place of residence. Children residing in the same household as part of an extended family, such as cousins, will not be treated as siblings. In the case of twins or triplets etc., both or all will be offered places.
3. Children of Staff. This will only apply where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years or where they are recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.
4. Children living in the priority admission area. The Helena Romanes School has a Priority Admissions Area. Within this criterion, children will be ranked in distance order for admission by straight line

distance within the Priority Admissions Area. Those living nearer will have a higher priority, starting with the nearest first. Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

5. Children of UK Service Personnel (UK Armed Forces) with a confirmed posting to the area can apply to the local authority in advance of their arrival provided the application is accompanied by an official letter that declares a relocation date and a Unit postal address or quartering area address.
6. Remaining applications.

Tie Break: In the event of a tie break, priority will be determined by straight line distance from the home to school, with those living nearest having highest priority. If undersubscription should occur priority will be determined without regard to the Priority Admission Area. Multiple birth siblings (twins and triplets etc.) from the same family who are tied for the final place will not be split. We will admit them all, as permitted by the infant class size rules and exceed our PAN.

Children of UK Armed forces-

- The address used on the application will be the postal address or quartering area address provided. Offers will be made in advance of a child's arrival for in-year applications and on the relevant offer date for normal round applications.
- Students attract the Service Pupil Premium if they meet the following criteria:
 - One of their parents is serving in the regular armed services (including pupils with one parent who is on full commitment as part of the full time reserves).
 - One of the parents died while serving in the armed forces and the pupil is in receipt of a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme (AFCS) and the War Pensions Scheme (WPS).

Admissions to Sixth Form

Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied, in the order given, to decide which children to admit:

1. Looked After Children and previously looked after children (as defined in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet).
2. Children who live in our catchment, who attend one of our feeder[^] schools, and who have a sibling* already here, together with those who live out of our catchment, who attend one of our feeder[^] schools, and who have a sibling* who was admitted in or prior to September 2025.
3. Children who live in our catchment, and who have a sibling already here, together with those who live out of our catchment and who have a sibling* who was admitted in or prior to September 2025.
4. Children who live in our catchment and attend one of our feeder[^] schools.
5. All other children who live in our catchment.
6. Children of school staff members.
7. Children who live outside our catchment but attend one of our feeders and already have a sibling here.
8. Children who live outside our catchment but have a sibling here.
9. Children who live outside our catchment but attend one of our feeder schools.
10. Any other children, ranked according to distance.

If a tie-break is necessary to determine which child is admitted, the child living closest to the school measured in a straight line will be given priority for admission. All Straight line distances are calculated by the LA as described in the Secondary Education in Essex 2025/2026 booklet.

Admission number and criteria:

- No student will be admitted to the school post-16 unless academic requirements, set out annually in the school's Sixth Form prospectus, have been met and there are places available on their chosen courses.
- All existing students in Year 11 at Saffron Walden County High School, who meet the overall and subject specific entry requirements of the subjects they choose, will be offered a place in the Sixth Form.
- In addition to students from our own Year 11 who meet our academic requirements, we will admit further students from other schools. Our published admission number (PAN) for external students is 90. The maximum number of students expected to be on roll in Year 12 is 340. The school will only consider admitting further external students above PAN if the overall number on roll will not exceed 340.
- In the first instance all offers made are conditional, based on the student's predicted GCSE grades.

Offers will be confirmed following publication of the GCSE results.

Procedure:

- All students, both internal and external, will be required to submit an online application form by the deadline date, as detailed in our Sixth Form prospectus. External applicants will be required to supply a copy of their most recent report and predicted grades.
- All applications received by the deadline will receive an informal guidance discussion in February, held to advise students on appropriate course selection, grade eligibility and expectations. Conditional offers will be made to eligible candidates who are best suited academically to their chosen courses, using their predicted GCSE grades as the indicator, subject to timetable constraints and the student achieving the required GCSE grades on results day.
- Any applications received after the published deadline will be treated as late applications and placed on a waiting list, ranked according to our oversubscription criteria.
- On GCSE results day, all applicants will be required to complete an online Sixth Form enrolment form, which will be emailed to them, in order to have their place confirmed. Offers will be confirmed by the end of results day to successful applicants who have met the grade eligibility for their chosen courses.
- Late applications will only be considered, after all offers have been confirmed, in accordance with our oversubscription criteria, subject to our agreed maximum class size not being exceeded and not exceeding our PAN of 340.
- Mid-year admissions will only be considered in accordance with our admissions policy and subject to a qualification being viable.
